

You can safely assume that ALL email requesting that you update your account, whatever the institution, whatever the type of account, is a phishing scam and should be ignored and deleted. If you reply to any of these emails, your personal financial information will be used in a fraudulent manner. Frequently, replying to these emails also infects your computer with a worm or virus, which finds and sends even more of your personal information to the criminal.

Please be safe and do not fall victim to these scams, no matter how "official" or "legitimate" these emails appear.





3. Online Orientation Safety Training for new employees was implemented in April.





CFC Receives Record Pledges Totaling \$268.5 Million in 2005; Federal Employees and Military Personnel Extend Record Pledging to Three Consecutive Years

Washington, D.C. – Federal civilian employees, postal workers and military personnel pledged a record-setting \$268.5 million in 2005 to the Combined Federal Campaign, administered by the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM). The \$268.5 million in pledges to the CFC last year represents an \$11 million increase over the \$257 million pledged in 2004.

Last year's pledge total for the nation's largest, employer-sponsored charity drive marks the third consecutive year the federal community has filled CFC coffers to new levels. Pledges to charities in the CFC of the National Capital Area (metropolitan Washington, D.C.) totaled \$57.6 million.

"The men and women of the U.S. civil service and America's military have once again shown their generosity to those less fortunate," said OPM Director Linda M. Springer. "In a year dominated by tragic, natural disasters at home, and challenges to establishing peace and democracy abroad, I am pleased by the response of the federal workforce and the military."

The 4.5 percent increase in pledges in 2005 is the highest percentage increase since 2001, when pledges jumped 7.3 percent following the terrorist attacks in the United States.

"Despite the added needs of the past year, the federal community rallied to provide significant and important aid through the CFC to those whose ties to their communities were temporarily lost," said Springer. "The monies donated through this wonderful program will be used to reunite families and friends, rebuild communities and neighborhoods, and reinforce the relationship between government and people."

Started in 1961, the Combined Federal Campaign is the nation's largest workplace charity drive and the only philanthropic effort permitted by law in the federal workplace. Since its inception, the CFC has raised more than \$5.5 billion.

Guard Service at the RRVARC



Security Guards:

The security company we contract with, General Security Services Corporation (GSSC), provides us with North Dakota certified law enforcement officers, most of them were formerly military police officers. To be certified as a North Dakota law enforcement officer they must meet the same requirements that the Highway Patrol or Fargo Police meet. Each officer goes through an extensive and lengthy background check. Officers meeting all the ND requirements are authorized to carry a pistol in Federal Facilities by 18 USC 930 subsection (c).

Officers of GSSC are identified by their uniform and badge; they do not need a separate ID badge. See picture of GSSC Officer to the right.

The service we have purchased from GSSC consists of frequent and irregular patrols. The guards are instructed to randomly inspect either the interior or the exterior of the buildings... generally there is not enough time to do both on one patrol.

Instructions to the officers:

The officers have been instructed to ask for identification from anyone in the Center who is not wearing their ID in a lawful fashion. If you are asked for ID you must provide it under penalty of Federal Property Management Regulations, Title 41, code of Federal Regulations, Subpart 101-20.302. Anyone not wearing an ID and unable to produce a valid government identification will be subject to arrest.

Keep in mind that there are additional rights that you give up by accepting employment at Federal Facilities.

Any person on Federal Property must submit, when asked, any bag, box, briefcase, automobile for inspection. Police officers retain the right to conduct personal inspections according to Federal Property Management Regulations, Title 41, code of Federal Regulations, Subpart 101-20.301.


